

ALTERNATIVE MEANS OF COMMUNICATION

Children who use limited verbal speech may use alternative methods of communication such as picture cards, communication boards, aided language mats and/or speech generating devices. Here are examples of some of the types of alternative communication your child's therapist may recommend with some possible skills to target using each device.



Button Devices

- Making requests ("want" or something specific)
- Commenting (go/stop/all done)
- Greetings/Farewells (hello/good-bye)
- Communicating when a break is needed
- Taking Turns (your turn/my turn)
- Transitions (Ex. "Time to clean up.")
 - Asking for repetition (more/again)
 - Answering yes/no questions



Communication Books

- Express wants/needs for items
- Aid language through academic subjects, settings or specific books/lessons
- Commenting (go/stop/all done)
- Answering questions

- Asking for repetition (more/again)
 - Good tool for specific events in the school setting (Ex. lunchtime, free play, art class, reading time)

Communication Board

- Makina requests or choices for preferred items Commenting (go/stop/all done)
 - Answering yes/no questions
 - Developing a better understanding of vocabulary words to include adjectives, prepositions, verbs, etc.)
 - Asking for repetition (more/again)
 - Core words are versatile and can be used to communicate through a larger setting of communication events.



Static Display Device

- Express wants/needs for items
 - Commenting (go/stop/all done)
- Answering simple questions
 - Asking for repetition (more/again)
- Putting together I-3 word phrases.
 - Limited to the vocabulary provided on the board
- Change create and change the boards as needed or the user makes progress

Will generate speech for the user



Picture Exchange System

- Making requests or choices for preferred items
- Commenting (go/stop/all done)
- Answering yes/no questions
- Developing a better understanding of vocabulary words to include adjectives, prepositions, verbs, etc.)
- Asking for repetition (more/again)
 - Exchange process is taught to expand from wants/needs to comments, answering questions and/or generating longer sentences



Dynamic Display Device

- Express wants/needs and knowledge
 - Commenting
- Answering questions
 - Asking for repetition/clarification
- Putting together multiple word phrases and sentences
- Access to a large amount of words and vocabulary
 - Can take longer to train the user and/or caregivers to use, device needs to be programmed for the user
- Will generate speech for the user
